### **Two 2008 Laureates Win Nobel Prize!**

The L'Oréal Corporate Foundation and UNESCO are delighted by the announcement of a Nobel Prize in Medicine to Professor Elizabeth Blackburn and a Nobel Prize in Chemistry for Professor Ada Yonath.

In 2008, Professor Blackburn had received the L'Oréal-UNESCO Award For Women in Science for North America

Yesterday, Elizabeth Blackburn was named laureate of the Nobel Prize in Medicine, together with Professors Carol Greider and Jack Szostak.

The L'Oréal Corporate Foundation and UNESCO warmly congratulate Professor Blackburn. In 2008, she had received the L'Oréal-UNESCO Award For Women in Science for discovering the nature and maintenance of chromosome ends and their roles in cancer and aging.

Ada Yonath today was announced as recipient of the Nobel Prize in Chemistry, together with Professors Venkatraman Ramakrishnan and Thomas Steitz.

#### A pionneering program launched 12 years ago

Created in 1998, the L'Oréal-UNESCO Awards For Women in Science were the first international scientific awards dedicated to women. Twelve years later, the program has become an international reference of scientific distinction and an inestimable source of motivation and inspiration for women in science.

In 2010, diversity will once again be at the core of the L'Oréal-UNESCO Awards, which recognize five eminent women scientists from five continents. The wonderful success of Professor Blackburn is a tremendous encouragement to women in science, as well as being a great example for the next generation."

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
